Development of the UQ vaccine candidate remains CSL's priority," a company spokeswoman said.

"However, we are currently in discussions with AstraZeneca and the Australian Government to assess whether it is possible to provide local manufacturing support for the Oxford University/AstraZeneca vaccine, should it prove successful, while protecting our commitment to the UQ vaccine.

We are assessing the viability of options ranging from the fill and finish of bulk product imported to Australia through to manufacture of the vaccine candidate under licence."

CSL Behring's Broadmeadows plant is currently set up for mammalian cell production or recombinant therapies, meaning there is baseline compatibility between Oxford University/AstraZeneca's candidate and CSL's expertise.

But the CSL spokeswoman said that while developments with Oxford University and AstraZeneca looked positive, success was far from guaranteed.

"There are a number of technical issues to work through and discussions are ongoing."

The Australian understands considerations that would need to be worked through before any agreement is struck include capacity to schedule manufacturing around CSL's existing product commitments as well as regulatory requirements.

CSL says it has capacity to produce 100 million doses of the UQ COVID-19 vaccine by

the end of next year if clinical trials in Australia and in high-infection areas overseas are successful.

It struck a partnership with the Oslo-based and Bill Gates-backed Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI) and UQ to accelerate the development and manufacturing of UQ's COVID-19 vaccine candidate.

CSL said last month negotiations with the federal government for a formal national supply agreement were ongoing, but highlighted that the Commonwealth provided a range of free vaccines through the National Immunisation Program, based on expert medical advice for eligible Australians.

The company also committed that its dose allocation would be used "at a minimum" to support its longstanding public health commitment to the Australian community.

"It is early days before we will know whether the UQ vaccine will be successful and clinical trials are not expected to be completed until mid to late 2021. Pricing will be a matter for discussion between CSL and the institutions and governments procuring the vaccine," CSL said.

"Any pricing agreed will be reasonable and reflect the investment required to sustain manufacturing, supply and availability.

"With respect to CEPI's dose allocation, this will be subject to CEPI's equitable access obligations, which require that the doses will be available first to populations at risk when and where they are needed, at prices both affordable to those populations and sustainable to CSL."

COVID-19 Sunday Morning Summary

- Globally there are 317,951 reported new COVID-19 infections with 5,819 further deaths. The global aggregate is currently 32,752,246 reported infections, 24,168,132 recoveries, 992, 979 deaths and 63,773 cases are considered serious or critical.
- Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk announced on social media on Saturday morning that Queensland has
 recorded three new cases of COVID-19 as restrictions begin to be eased in the south-east of the state.
 Two of the new cases are crew members from an international liner with the third, an overseas arrival
 who is now in quarantine. Some restrictions on gatherings were lifted in Queensland on Friday after 14
 days of no community transmissions. Up to 30 people can now gather at people's homes and outdoors,
 in line with the rest of the state. There are 7 active cases of COVID-19 in the state, six people have
 died and 1,141 patients have recovered.
- In Western Australia, nine crew members from the bulk carrier Patricia Oldendorff, which arrived from Manila early this week, have been diagnosed with COVID-19. Two crew members who previously tested positive to COVID-19 are in already in a Port Hedland hotel and are being quarantined in a

secure, separate wing with another ten, staying in a separate part of the hotel, awaiting test results. Health Minister Roger Cook said a decision would be made overnight as to whether the seven new cases should also be placed in hotel quarantine or remain on board the vessel.

- Victoria reported one more COVID-19 death and 12 new cases on Saturday, taking the state toll to
 782. NSW reported no new locally acquired cases yesterday but one new case was recorded from a
 returning overseas traveller who is now in quarantine. NSW recorded no locally acquired cases after a
 mystery new case on Friday ended its three-day streak of no community transmission. The national
 COVID-19 death toll is 870.
- The head of the International Olympic Committee, Thomas Bach, says the Tokyo Games could take place next year even without a coronavirus vaccine, pointing to the success of the Tour de France. Mr Bach says sport is coming back slowly with a number of big sport events already successfully organised recently, including matches in different Japanese leagues. Mr Bach adds that complex events like the Tour de France indicated to the world that sporting events can be organised safely, even without a vaccine. The Olympics were postponed earlier this year because of the pandemic and are now set to open on July 23, 2021.

- Globally there are 399,585 reported new COVID-19 infections with 6,107 further deaths. The global aggregate is currently 39,153,507 reported infections, 29,371,353 recoveries, 1,102,433 deaths and 70,885 cases are considered serious or critical.
- NSW has recorded five new COVID-19 cases overnight, including one case of community transmission linked to a Lakemba cluster which now totals 16 people. Victoria recorded two new coronavirus cases on Friday and two new cases of COVID-19 were diagnosed in Queensland. The national death toll is 904: Victoria 816, NSW 55, Tasmania 13, WA 9, Queensland 6, SA 4 and the ACT 3.
- Victoria's hotel quarantine inquiry will hold an extraordinary sitting next week, days after Daniel
 Andrews and his senior staff were asked to hand their phone records to the investigation. The Board of
 Inquiry proposes to hold a sitting at 2pm on Tuesday 20 October. It is unclear whether the inquiry,
 headed by former Family Court Judge Jennifer Coate, will recall Mr Andrews. The Inquiry has resulted

in the resignations of Health Minister Jenny Mikakos and former Department of Premier and Cabinet secretary Chris Eccles.

- Fourteen passengers have been detained in Melbourne after they arrived from New Zealand under the trans-Tasman bubble arrangements. The passengers flew to Sydney and boarded a connecting flight to Melbourne despite Melbourne currently not accepting international travellers. The Australian Department of Home Affairs says that quarantine-free travel from New Zealand will initially be to New South Wales and the Northern Territory only, with other states and territories to be added at a later date. A spokesperson from the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade (MFAT) says the ministry has not been approached in relation to this matter.
- Millions of people will be banned from mixing indoors, with London due to be placed under tier 2 COVID-19 restrictions from this weekend. Prime Minister Boris Johnson says London will move from tier 1 to tier 2, or from "medium" to "high" alert, from 12:01 am on Saturday under the new tiered system. Tier 2 restrictions mean different households will be banned from mixing indoors, including inside homes, pubs and restaurants, and Londoners will also be told to avoid public transport and making non-essential travel. Matt Hancock, Health Secretary, says the tighter restrictions were needed in London as coronavirus infections were doubling every 10 days.



- Globally there are 406,580 reported new COVID-19 infections with 4,500 further deaths. The global aggregate is currently 43,325,816 reported infections, 31,896,736 recoveries, 1,158,917 deaths and 77,727 cases are considered serious or critical.
- Victorian Premier Daniel Andrews has partially ended Melbourne's COVID-19 lockdown with retail,
 hospitality, entertainment and small businesses being allowed to return to work from midnight tonight,
 with strict capacity restraints, marking the end of the 112-day lockdown. The reopening follows a
 testing blitz across the north of Melbourne that found no new cases or deaths from COVID-19 and the
 state recording the first day with no new cases since before the second wave started, 139 days ago.
- Motorsport driver Jamie Whincup drove one of his team's semi-trailers home after racing in the
 Bathurst 1000 in New South Wales so he could cross the Queensland border with a freight pass. But
 now he has been evicted from the Sunshine State along with six teammates after authorities told them
 to enter hotel quarantine or return to New South Wales. Police are now investigating other supercar

teams who entered the state on freight passes after racing in Bathurst, a COVID-19 hotspot, on October 17 and 18.

- A new poll shows West Australians increasingly want Premier Mark McGowan to set a tentative date for the opening of WA's hard border as Victoria yesterday went without any new cases for the first time since June, giving renewed hope that WA's updated roadmap for easing interstate travel restrictions will provide certainty to businesses and allow families to reunite for Christmas. Tourism Council WA's Evan Hall says the border should only reopen based on health advice, but the state needed a date to work towards.
- There were emotional scenes at Hobart Airport yesterday as Tasmania's borders opened to COVID-19
 safe states and families and friends were reunited after spending months apart with Premier Peter
 Gutwein saying he was pleased to welcome tourists back. A strong police presence was at the airport to
 enforce COVID-19 compliance, but little social distancing was seen when arriving passengers jumped
 to embrace those awaiting their return.
- The NSW-Victorian border could stay closed for weeks because the Berejiklian government remains
 unconvinced Victorian health authorities could manage a new outbreak after restrictions in Melbourne
 are eased this week. Despite pushing for the border with Queensland to reopen, the NSW government

TALKING POINTS

- The Australian Government is working hard to ensure a safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine can be delivered to Australians, as soon as it becomes available.
- I am pleased to announce we have now finalised two additional agreements for leading vaccine candidates worth over \$1.5 billion, to secure early supply of 50 million doses:
 - **10 million doses** of the **Pfizer vaccine**: One of the world's most promising vaccine candidates. If proven safe and effective, delivery is expected to start in **early 2021**.

- These particular vaccine candidates have also been endorsed by our group of experts advising on COVID-19 vaccines.
- These deals build on our previous billions in investments, for critical COVID-19 vaccines:

- With **four agreements in place** for early access to over **134.8 million vaccine doses**, Australians will be among the first in the world to receive a safe and effective vaccine, should it receive approval from the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA).
 - Through our agreements, Australians can also take comfort that we anticipate we will have more than enough vaccines for the entire Australian population.

- The Government has also been busy planning for a **rapid rollout of these vaccines** on a needs-basis, the likes of which Australia will have never seen before.
 - This is a complex exercise in which we have to plan for every possible scenario, and we will keep the public informed as we lock in details and arrangements.
 - But our frontline workers, who are at increased risk of exposure, and those who have an
 increased risk of developing severe disease or outcomes must be at the forefront of
 receiving any vaccine.

- But as I have made clear: whoever finds the vaccine first must share it.
 - Australia is committed to ensuring early and equitable access to COVID-19 vaccines, treatments and diagnostics for countries in our Pacific family and South East Asia.
 - To this end, Australia announced an additional \$500 million in aid on Saturday 31 October, on top of the \$23.2 million announced in the Budget support vaccine access and health security for the Pacific and Southeast Asia.

- In total, Australia has now committed over **\$4.6 billion** to COVID-19 vaccines and treatments research and development, procurement and international aid.
 - As we can see through these additional agreements for the leading Pfizer vaccine and Novavax vaccine, and our now diverse portfolio of vaccines, our Government continues to put the health and lives of Australians and those across the world first.
 - This is why the Australian Government is continuing discussions with many parties around the world, while backing Australia's own researchers to find a vaccine.
- I wish our researchers across the world every success in their efforts to develop an innovative vaccine to fight the COVID-19 pandemic across the globe, and save countless lives. Every hurdle they jump gives us the hope we need to get through to the other side.

If asked:

Indemnities and Vaccine Safety – Why is Australia providing indemnities for COVID-19 vaccines, and does this show that COVID-19 vaccines will not be safe?

- Our first priority for any COVID-19 vaccine is that it meets the highest product safety and quality standards.
- Our Government has acknowledged the need to appropriately share risks associated with achieving early access to a successful vaccine, and has actively engaged with potential COVID-19 vaccine suppliers on this issue.
- Specific details contained in the Advanced Purchase Agreements, including those around indemnity, are not public and the Australian Government is conscious of maintaining commercial confidentiality of the arrangements.
- Before any COVID-19 vaccine is approved in Australia, it must pass the TGA's stringent
 assessment and approval processes. The TGA is closely monitoring trials of COVID
 vaccines and is engaging closely with relevant pharmaceutical companies.

Risk of Vaccine Failure – Is there a risk that our 'chosen' vaccines will fail, and what are we doing to manage this risk?

- All four of Australia's initial 'chosen' vaccines are showing very promising signs in trials.
- We are confident a COVID-19 vaccine will be found, but there are no guarantees.
- This is why we have worked hard to secure access to a diverse portfolio of vaccine candidates and continue to closely monitor the progress through clinical trials of a number of potential vaccine candidates to ensure Australians can access a vaccine, and progress the next steps in our COVID-19 Vaccine and Treatment Strategy.

Mandatory Vaccine – Will a COVID-19 vaccine be mandatory?

- A COVID-19 vaccine is the best way to protect the Australian community.
- We want to achieve the highest rate of vaccination possible, and we will look at ways to achieve this goal.
- It will not be compulsory to have the vaccine.
- All vaccines in Australia meet the highest safety, ethical and efficacy standards.

Priority Cohorts and Rollout – Who will receive the COVID-19 vaccine first in Australia?

- These considerations are now being worked through. Any decisions on rollout of a COVID-19 vaccine and related policies will be based on the advice of the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation and other experts.
- It is likely the first vaccine doses will be given to front-line health care workers, carers of vulnerable people, and if safety data supports, vulnerable people. This is consistent with WHO recommendations.
- Beyond that, we will look at sectors and groups that are critical to the functioning of Australian society and the economy.

ATTACHMENT B

BACKGROUND

New Agreements for the Pfizer Vaccine (Vaccine #3) and the Novavax Vaccine (Vaccine #4)

• These agreements forms part of the Government's \$3.2 billion investment for early supply and manufacture of COVID-19 vaccines in Australia.

BioNTech/Pfizer mRNA vaccine from Germany and the US (Operation Warp Speed)

- The Government has committed \$ 34(3) for 10 million doses of the Pfizer vaccine candidate. Delivery is expected across 2021, from early 2021.
- The Pfizer vaccine candidate is now in Phase 3 clinical ('human') trials, after showing preliminary positive results in Phases 1 and 2.
- The Government continues to monitor the vaccine's progress as trial results are assessed and it is tested in bigger groups.
- On 14 October, the Therapeutic Goods Administration granted a provisional determination to Pfizer for its vaccine candidate.
- The US, UK, Japan, Canada, Europe and New Zealand have also entered into agreements with Pfizer to purchase the vaccine, should it prove effective and gain regulatory approval.

Other COVID-19 vaccine candidates

- As of 30 October 2020, there are more than 201 vaccine candidates in development including 45 in human clinical trials (according to the WHO COVID-19 vaccine candidate landscape).
- Given the many promising vaccine candidates emerging, the Australian Government is monitoring a range of candidates to build a diverse portfolio of COVID-19 vaccines.
- The table following provides a summary of the vaccine candidates the Department of Health is monitoring and are currently in human clinical trials.
