- In accordance with the guides referred to in Note 1, for the two largest cohorts of penalties in the table:
  - No Show, No Pay penalties represent a penalty of one-tenth of fortnightly income support.
  - Eight week non-payment periods may be waived due to financial hardship or by the job seeker choosing to re-engage in activities. Nationally, 94.4 per cent of these penalties were either partially or fully waived in 2015-16 (and 94.1 per cent due to job seekers re-engaging in activities).
