Summary of evidence before the Senate Select Committee on COVID-19

Date: 05 May 2020

Departments and agencies in attendance:

- Department of Home Affairs
- Australian Border Force (ABF)
- Department of Agriculture

Summary:

- Home Affairs and Agriculture portfolio responses Agencies gave the committee an overview of their roles and responsibilities in responding to COVID-19.
 - Agriculture outlined their role as human biosecurity officers at ports, as well as broader responsibilities in biosecurity regulation. Home Affairs discussed their national coordination role (NCM), community protection (through AFP) and "protecting critical infrastructure and systems of national significance from cyberthreats" (ACSC). ABF outlined the implementation of travel restrictions and border control and exemptions from controls.
 - The Committee were particularly interested in understanding the division of responsibility between ABF officers and Agriculture officers.
 - No implications for PM&C.
- <u>Disembarkation of passengers from the Ruby Princess</u> On 19 March some 2,700 passengers from the Ruby Princess disembarked in Sydney. According to media reports, the Ruby Princess is linked to approximately 700 COVID-19 cases and 21 deaths.
 - Agriculture outlined that their actions were guided by NSW Health advice. ABF outlined that their role is not to clear human biosecurity (mostly focusing on ensuring all passengers have valid visas).
 - PM&C may be asked which agency 'was or should have been responsible' for passenger disembarkation. Suggest referring Senators to evidence provided by the Secretary of the Department of Agriculture and the Commissioner of the ABF.
- <u>COVIDSafe mobile phone application</u> Home Affairs discussed its involvement with the development of the COVIDSafe app.
 - On or about 28 March, DTA asked Home Affairs to assist with the development of a prototype as DTA were focused on the coronavirus information app. DHA engaged with AWS off the standing panel; DTA engaged them separately. The app work was handed off to DTA on 2 April. The Committee was also interested in the CLOUD Act and access to data by US authorities. Secretary Pezzullo guaranteed that a US Court would not uphold a warrant seeking access COVIDSafe data.
 - No implications for PM&C.
- Border closures The Committee was interested in why the Government waited to close the borders on 20 March and claimed to be 'world leading' when many countries had closed their borders days earlier.
 - Home Affairs noted that the Government's response was based on medical advice from the AHPPC and decisions were taken collectively by NSC and the National Cabinet.
 - PM&C may be asked to comment on the timing of the various border restrictions.

- <u>Source of COVID-19 from Wuhan wet markets</u> The Committee was interested in whether the government was certain about the source of COVID-19 and when the Government was first notified.
 - o **Agriculture** said that while not definitive, it was "a strong supposition" that it had come from a wet market.
 - Home Affairs referred the committee to the CMO's evidence that he was notified in January, and that "Australia would not resile from calling for a properly constituted inquiry".
 - o No implications for PM&C.





AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT IMPLEMENTS BORDER CONTROL TO TARGET PROFITEERING ON EXPORTS OF ESSENTIAL GOODS TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19 IN AUSTRALIA

The Australian Government's first priority is the safety and welfare of the Australian community.

Following an announcement by the Prime Minister on 24 March 2020, a new temporary measure to restrict individuals from hoarding and profiteering from the export of personal protective equipment and other items needed to help combat the spread of COVID-19 is now in place.

The full list of items covered by the new measure include the following:

- Personal protective equipment in the form of disposable face masks, disposable gloves, disposable gowns, protective eye wear in the form of goggles, glasses or visors, which can be worn by individuals to limit the transmission of organisms; and
- Alcohol wipes and hand sanitizer.

The changes follow an amendment to the Customs (Prohibited Exports) Regulations 1958.

"The Amendment limits the means by which goods essential to preventing the spread of the COVID-19 virus can be exported from Australia," Minister for Home Affairs Peter Dutton said.

"This is a targeted measure to stop exploitative practices and profiteering, while safeguarding legitimate trade."

The Amendment prohibits the export of the listed items by post, however it remains possible to export the goods by courier services or cargo in the following circumstances:

- for personal use by a passenger or crew member in their accompanied personal or household effects;
- by a person to a relative of the person, for the relative's personal use;
- by a humanitarian organisation for non-commercial purposes;
- by an Australian manufacturer of the goods; or

• by a person or business who exported those types of goods in the course of their ordinary business, and is registered for Australian Goods and Services Tax and has an Australian Business Number.

"The exemptions to the export controls ensure that legitimate exporters can continue to trade in goods essential to combatting the pandemic, including commercial trade," Minister Dutton said.

"These exemptions importantly reflect the Government's commitment to maintaining an open global trading system and preserving legitimate supply chains to support the response to COVID-19."

The Customs (Prohibited Exports) Amendment (COVID-19 Human Biosecurity Emergency) Regulations 2020 takes effect immediately. The Amendment prohibits the export of the goods for the period that the Biosecurity (Human Biosecurity Emergency) (Human Coronavirus with Pandemic Potential) Declaration 2020 is in force.

The maximum penalty for breaching the Regulations is 1,000 penalty units (or \$210,000).





ISSUE

Tomorrow (check) the Minister will announce the new temporary measures to restrict individuals from hoarding, non-commercially exporting and profiteering on certain products that are essential to help combat the pandemic, including personal protective equipment and disinfectant products (media release provided separately).

TALKING POINTS UNCLASSIFIED

- The Australian Government's first priority is the safety and welfare of the Australian community.
- As foreshadowed by the Prime Minister on 24 March, the Government is responding
 promptly to concerns about people hoarding and profiteering on certain products that are
 essential to combatting the pandemic.
 - This includes cases of people collecting large quantities of protective equipment and disinfectants in Australia to export overseas.
- This is a targeted measure to stop exploitative practices and profiteering, while safeguarding legitimate trade.
- The Amendment limits the means by which goods essential to preventing the spread of the COVID-19 virus can be exported from Australia.
- The following goods are now controlled on export:
 - Personal protective equipment in the form of disposable face masks, disposable gloves, disposable gowns, protective eye wear in the form of goggles, glasses or visors, which can be worn by individuals to limit the transmission of organisms; and
 - Alcohol wipes and hand sanitizer.
- The Amendment prohibits the export of these goods by post absolutely. However, it remains possible to export these goods by other means, such as courier services or cargo, in the following circumstances:
 - for personal use by a passenger or crew member in their accompanied personal or household effects;
 - o by a person to a relative of the person, for the relative's personal use

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- o by a humanitarian organisation for non-commercial purposes;
- o by an Australian manufacturer of the goods; or

If asked: Has the reported export of valuable equipment led to shortages in Australia?

- Profiteering and hoarding of goods prevents those goods being available for vulnerable members of our community
 - o As the PM has said before, this type of behaviour is very disappointing
 - These measures are part of the Government's targeted response to stop these exploitative practices.
 - These measures will not prevent legitimate trade in these goods.
- The Government is taking action to ensure it won't happen again.

If asked: Will the Government be investigating the reports of export of equipment as possible breaches of foreign interference laws?

 As per long standing practice, the Government will not provide ongoing commentary on operational matters.

If asked: What is the Government doing about foreign interference?

- The Australian Government has taken significant steps to strengthen Australia's capacity to protect us from foreign interference.
- As the Prime Minister said previously, Australians can be assured that the resources have never been stronger, the laws have never been tougher and the Government has never been more determined to keep Australians free and safe from foreign interference.
- The Prime Minister announced the establishment of a Counter Foreign Interference
 Taskforce on 2 December 2019, to disrupt and deter anyone attempting to undermine
 our national interests.
 - The operational taskforce is led by a senior ASIO officer, with representatives from ASIO, the AFP, the Australian Transactions Report and Analysis Centre, the Australian Signals Directorate and the Australian Geospatial Intelligence Organisation all contributing to its work.
